

 time stands still...



EAGLE BASE – Maj. Gen. David L. Grange assumed command of Task Force Eagle during a special ceremony Wednesday, replacing Maj. Gen. Montgomery C. Meigs, who will soon be commanding general at Fort Leavenworth, Kan.

“I am honored and I am privileged to be a member of SFOR and to contribute to the international peace effort in Bosnia,” said Grange, accepting the 1st Infantry Division colors during the transfer of authority ceremony. “To take command of Task Force Eagle...is a leadership commitment, a high standard I will meet.”

General William W. Crouch, commander of the Stabilization Force and U.S. Army

Europe, attended the ceremony, congratulating Meigs for his leadership of Task Force Eagle since last November.

“An officer with 30 years of experience, (Meigs) is a proven leader. He knows coalition formation and operation. (He’s) an accomplished historian and scholar, a published author. More importantly, he is a consummate professional soldier who’s orchestrated the task necessary to enable MND-North to accomplish its mission,” said Crouch.

Meigs, who has been nominated for a third star, spoke briefly on his experiences in Bosnia-Herzegovina and thanked all the soldiers of Task Force Eagle for a successful mission. He also wished the American forces good luck in the coming months.

“To (Maj. Gen.) Grange...good luck in this most difficult mission. I am glad to have such an experienced leader of character taking over my old outfit,” said Meigs.

Grange comes to Bosnia-Herzegovina from the Pentagon, where he has served as director of Army Operations, Readiness and Mobilization. Grange is a twice-wounded combat veteran who received his commission in 1969. He served two tours in Vietnam, first as a rifle platoon leader with the 101st Airborne Division and then as a reconnaissance advisor to the 81st Airborne Ranger Group.

A graduate of the flight school, Grange also served in the 101st Airborne Division and the 75th Rangers. After a tour of duty as a battalion commander in Korea, Grange was the deputy commander of the 1st Special Applications Group at Fort Bragg, where he commanded a Special Operations Task Force during Operation Desert Storm. From 1991-93, he was the commander of the 75th Rangers. He has also served as assistant divisional commander for the 3rd Infantry Division.

“The friendship and mentorship that Gen. Meigs has provided gives me the required confidence and drive I will need in this command. With all my heart I truly thank his efforts,” said Grange.

Despite the good work completed by SFOR under Meigs’ command, Grange said American forces still have a long way to go before leaving Bosnia-Herzegovina.

“Task Force Eagle will continue to execute its responsibilities as directed to standard within the general framework agreement for peace,” he said.

Meigs’ new command will be a challenge but he is ready, he said, because of his experience in Bosnia-Herzegovina.

“On taking on this mission in Bosnia, our division’s command team had the unprecedented opportunity to design from scratch, then form, train, deploy and employ the covering force, and now the current forces you see today in this area of operation. This kind of opportunity, to build a force from the ground up, and then to use it, almost never happens in military affairs. For a leader like myself, this work presented a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity,” Meigs said.

Meigs leaves Bosnia-Herzegovina marking his 30th year of service in the U.S. Army. He is a Vietnam veteran and has served as commander of the 3rd Infantry Division (re-designated as the 1st Infantry Division in 1996) since 1995. He expressed sadness at leaving, but was confident in the professionalism of the soldiers, not only of the 1st Infantry Division, but of the entire SFOR.

“To all of you from the other nations...I want you to know how important it has been to me to soldier with you and to learn from you. To all the American troopers present...thanks for being the terrific, disciplined, spirited soldiers that you are. You serve our nation in the best way imaginable,” said Meigs.
